2024 YEAR IN REVIEW

WINTER

The year began with a Strategic Planning exercise for board members, staff and volunteers on January 12th and 13th. The day after the planning session the thermometer dropped to -10C leading to frozen pipes at the centre (thankfully no pipes burst) followed by a dump of snow.

SPRING EDUCATION PROGRAMS

With warmer weather in the spring, we welcomed students into the centre.

Under the experienced guidance of Madeline Southern many school groups came through the centre in the spring of 2024. Students ranged in age from kindergarten through grade twelve. They experienced hands-on-nature conservation and science-oriented school programs on the shores of Hecate Park linked with the Province of BC's curriculum outcomes.



The popular **Sea Squirts** stories and activities program ran every Wednesday in March hosted by VIU practicum students and again in May hosted by Nicky MacDonald.

SPRING EVENTS

April 7th - Scully the Sculpin who was loved by many but was getting too big for the touch tank was released back to the sea.

April 13th We held a goodbye tea for Anna Scouten, who was the restoration coordinator but now has a full time position with the School Board and Louisa Varco, who was the aquarist keeping the critters in the tank healthy and fed but now is working full time with DFO.

April 20th We had a booth at the City of Duncan's Earth Day celebrations

April 21st was our 14th birthday so we held a B'EarthDay Party attended by over 70 people. Jack Connelly provided live music, Genevieve Singleton and Philomena Williams talked with visitors about native plants.





Throughout the month of June volunteers were involved with **Dungeness Crab Larval monitoring** in conjunction with CERCA and the Hakai Institute. Monitoring the trap which was installed at the Maritime Centre

SUMMER

Summer is always a busy time at the Centre with **summer camps** running Monday to Friday throughout July and August. Pheobe and Paisley were our excellent camp leaders this summer.

Sea Squirts, drop in program for parents/guardians and tots from 0-6 saw 3-7 families every week in the fall.

Home School Enrichment Program offered in the fall of 2024 for the first time.

One of many special times for the home school learners was on Friday October 25 when the junior home learners attended an "Estuary at Night," learning session, where they learned about owls, and bats.

We had a booth at this special event held on the banks of the Cowichan River hosted by Cowichan Tribes and Cowichan Stewardship Roundtable. The picture to the left shows the public unrolling of the fish prints that were collected during the public art project called **Project 84,000**. The Nature Centre was one of several public locations where people could add to the art rubbings honouring the estimated 84,000 juvenile steelhead trout, lake trout, cutthroat trout, and other

species that died in the Cowichan River in July 2023 due to environmental stress.

shared their knowledge.





Brackish Biodiversity. He brought along ocean critters collected by the scuba dive team from
Brentwood College.

Kim Lagimodiere, the program coordinator for Cowichan Tribes' S-hwuhwaus Thi'lut Kw'atl'kwa (Thunderbird Protecting the Ocean), spoke about the importance of the estuary to Quw'utsun Mustimuhw.



Bethany Coultard, Cowichan Tribes' Marine Projects Supervisor, shared a glimpse into the Marine Team's work in the Estuary and beyond.

Two young ecologists and a Mom from the Nature Centre's home learner's program, wrapped up the evening with thoughts on the importance of science spaces for kids.
